OPERATION GENRE-

ADULT FICTION SECTION INTO GENRES MAKES A BETTER **BROWSING EXPERIENCE**

FOR PATRONS

DIVIDING THE added new labels with the genre and the author's first and last name. If the book was a part of a series, a series label was added at the top of the spine. And, books whose author writes in multiple genres received a stamp inside the front cover to indicate this.

> Then came the huge task of re-organizing the entire fiction section. At a recent staff training day, library staff members spent six hours moving approximately 8400 books multiple times as they cleared the shelves and sorted the books, then re-shelved each book in its appropriate genre collection. The result? Operation Genrefication is now complete! And we're just waiting for the next time you wonder where you can find a new mystery, romance novel, fantastical tale, or story from the past.



"I'd like to find a new mystery to read. Where can I find all the mystery books?"

Such questions are fairly common here at the Library. Up until this point, we've only been able point patrons in the direction of the general adult fiction section. And of course, browsing shelves upon shelves of books categorized only by the author's last name can be a daunting experience if you're not looking for a specific title.

Enter the genre-fication project - the task of dividing the adult fiction section into eight different genres. These include Mystery, Thriller, Romance, Historical, Fantasy/Science Fiction, Horror, Western, and a general fiction section.

Staff members worked for months to identify the genre (and series, if applicable) of each book in the adult fiction section. Once identified, volunteers removed the old spine labels from each book and





CHAT WITH THE LIBRARY DIRECTOR 00000

How Does the Library Decide What Books to Buy?

Mahomet Public Library's Board of Trustees recently noted that the Library now spends over \$100,000/year on library materials. We sat down with Library Director, John Howard, to discuss how the Library decides what to add to our collection.

Q: Do you buy all the materials yourself?


A: I buy all the books for our adult collection. Our Youth Librarian, Becca, purchases children's, middle school, and young adult materials, and other staff members purchase DVDs and music CDs.

Q: Out of all the books published each year, how do you know which ones to purchase?

A: There are several tools that we use. The first is "autopurchase." There are certain authors that are always popular. We maintain an "autopurchase" list with our book distributor, and they send us between 1-4 copies of anything new published by those authors. Kristin Hannah is a good example of a "4-copy autopurchase," but only a few authors call for that many copies. Currently we have 175 authors or series on the list, but we review and update it often. After that, we use reviews from three sources - Library Journal, Booklist, and School Library Journal. These magazines have short reviews of upcoming titles. We highlight the books that look good for our collection, and a staff member orders them. We also order some titles from the New York Times bestseller list. In addition, we get a weekly report which shows every item that has two or more holds from Mahomet patrons. This really helps catch things that are popular that we may have missed. Sometimes it shows us that we need to buy additional copies due to high demand. Finally, we consider purchase requests from patrons. We do not buy every single thing that is recommended, but we look at and consider every one. You can make recommendations on our website or in the Library.



Q: What criteria do you use?

A: Mostly, we try to match what we buy with what our patrons want. Over time, you learn what circulates and what is less likely to. People are different in every town, so there is no "one size fits all" for buying books. You just try to know and understand your community. There is an old but very true quote that says "A book should be a mirror and a book should be a window." People want to find books where they see themselves, but books are also the very best way I know to learn about people who are different. We try to provide a diverse collection for this reason.

Q: We always have a good selection of nonfiction books. Is buying them different?

A: Yes. Of course we buy the most popular titles. But in nonfiction, we make a real effort to buy books that reflect a variety of viewpoints. When we buy books about politics and culture, we try to make sure different sides of an issue are represented. You shouldn't know anything about our personal beliefs by the books that we buy for the Library. Someone once said "There should be something in the library to offend everyone." I'm not sure about that, but I do believe that we learn and grow more by reading things that we disagree with.

Q: What about eBooks vs physical copies?

A: Deciding how to divide funds between physical books and eBooks is a big decision that is constantly changing. People want them both ways, and we do our best to provide them. We are spending more each year on electronic copies via Libby and report and New York Times Hoopla, but about 80% of our checkouts are still physical copies.
