



#### **Signing Up for Email Recommendations:**

To sign up, simply fill out the email preferences form on our library website. This form includes options to add or remove specific genre/subject categories to your personalized email list based off your interests.

The genre/subject categories include both fiction and nonfiction categories. Some of the fiction genre categories are mystery, thriller/suspense, inspirational fiction, and historical fiction. Nonfiction subject categories include, home, garden, and crafts, travel, spirituality, health and wellbeing

In addition to the genre/subject categories, you'll also be able to select categories of books based on specific age groups that you're interested in, including picture books, kids, middle school, and teens.

#### When You Receive an Email:

All of the books recommended in the emails you'll receive are available in the Illinois Heartland Library System, the system our Library is a part of. If you are interested in a specific title, simply click on the picture of the book. This link will take you to the book in our Aspen catalog, where you can log into your library account and place a hold on it. Log into your account with your library card barcode (the number on the back of your library card, no spaces), and your pin (typically the last four digits of the phone number associated with your account).


#### TY'S PICK: **BLOOD OVER BRIGHT HAVEN**

Martha Ballard is a midwife during the late 1700s. Martha documents the details of an alleged rape committed by two of the town's men-one of whom has just been found dead in the ice. But when the new local doctor undermines her conclusion, declaring the death an accident. Martha is forced to investigate the murder on her own. Based on the life of the real midwife Martha Ballard, this

story is an interesting tale of a remarkable woman. Find it on our fiction shelves and in the Libby and CloudLibrary apps.

#### **MEGAN'S PICK: AFTER HOURS ON MILAGRO STREET**



Alejandra "Alex" Torres barges into her grandmother's rundown bar in Kansas. She does NOT expect to crash into Dr. Jeremiah Post. Their chemistry is immediate. The main characters are complex and both work to heal their childhood wounds. I loved how the author incorporated the rich, real-life pocket of history that informed Alex's family and community: Mexican

Americans who originally immigrated to help build the transcontinental railroads. Find it on our fiction shelves and in the Hoopla and Libby apps.
